WHAT IS THE LEAGUE?

The CALIFORNIA LEAGUE OF CONSERVATION VOTERS is the campaign arm of the conservation movement in California. Its Board of Directors is drawn from all of the major environmental organizations in the state. It is nonpartisan, believing that concern for the environment transcends political parties. CLCV cooperates with both the national League of Conservation voters and a dynamic, expanding network of local LCV's to achieve its goals. CLCV is a registered campaign committee, and is the only conservation organization in California working full time on political campaigns.

OUR GOALS:

1. To elect to public office good people who will stand up and fight for the environment; to defeat those who consistently oppose environmental needs.
2. To inform the public of the performance and records of all public officials so that those who have been elected as conservationists continue to be responsive to our concerns.

OUR TOOLS:

VOTING CHART: This voting chart records the performance of the state legislature on conservation issues. The legislature is much more responsive to public concerns like the environment when it knows that an *informed* citizenry is watching its performance.

CAMPAIGN INFORMATION AND ENDORSEMENTS: CLCV endorses outstanding candidates for public office all over California, and publishes profiles of key candidates and races.

VOLUNTEERS: CLCV mobilizes grass-roots conservationists, trains them in campaign techniques, encourages them to work on behalf of good candidates in critical races, and to raise conservation issues in campaigns in their districts.

DONATIONS: The League solicits campaign contributions from conservationists all over the state, and uses them to help those good candidates in need of such funds. Even though these donations are small compared with the contributions of typical interests, through careful selection of races CLCV is able to make *the* difference in a number of campaigns. This is a significant accomplishment when one considers that business, for example, gave politicians over \$3 million in 1976, and conservationists, through the League, gave only \$11,000.

MEDIA INFORMATION

CLCV provides the public and the media with detailed progress reports on the legislature; in this way the public can compare the promises and statements of public officials with their actual performance. Public officials who work hard for the environment get credit for their effort; those who do not are held accountable by the voters.

ABOUT THIS CHART:

This chart evaluates members for the last half of the 1977-1978 session of the legislature. It lists floor votes cast, both in committee and on the floor, for 25 key bills, covering such important areas as land use, pollution, wildlife preservation, parks, wilderness, and energy. The percentage scores listed at the end of the chart were computed by dividing the total number of correct conservation votes a legislator cast by the total number of opportunities he or she had to vote for the environment. Official absences from the legislature on a given day (A), were not counted as opportunities. When bills supported by conservationists were defeated, abstentions helped contribute to those defeats. They were therefore scored as wrong votes. But when conservationists prevailed, abstentions were not scored since many legislators may have been out of the room when the vote was cast and not recalled since they were not needed. On bills opposed by conservationists, abstentions which helped to kill the bill were scored as correct votes.

LAND USE AND COASTAL

1. AB 1900 (Calvo) Establishes a state commission to review and regulate the use of agricultural lands in California. Supported by conservationists as the most effective proposal to preserve the state's prime agricultural lands. Died in Senate.
2. AB 3147 (Fazio) Appropriates funds for the study of riparian habitat. Supported by conservationists. Signed by Governor.
3. AB 3663 (Berman) Appropriates funds for the inclusion of parts of the Santa Monica Mountains in the state park system. Supported by conservationists. Signed by Governor.
4. SB 1873 (Smith) Strengthens the ability of local planning agencies and the coastal commissions to carry out the intents of the Coastal Act. Supported by conservationists. Signed by Governor.
5. SB 1555 (Nejedly) Provided that a project would receive a Coastal Commission permit on the second hearing if a majority of the Commission was not present at that hearing. Opposed by conservationists because it could have led to the approval of many bad projects. Bill totally changed in Assembly and no longer opposed.
6. AB 3478 (Nestande) Extends the jurisdiction of the regional Coastal Commissions from their original expiration date in 1979 until 1981. This provides the Regional Commissions with a much more adequate period of time to see that good Local Coastal Programs are developed under the Coastal Protection Act. Supported by conservationists. Signed by Governor.
7. AB 2969 (Keene) Limits the jurisdiction of the Coastal Commission to a much narrower geographical area, excluding such areas as the Eel River Valley, much of the Santa Monica Mountains, and prime agricultural areas in Del Norte County from Coastal Commission jurisdiction. Opposed by conservationists in Assembly Resources. Subsequently amended to remove objectionable features and no longer opposed.

ENERGY

8. SB 1015 (Russell) Exempts the Sundesert Nuclear power plant from the provisions of California's nuclear safeguards legislation. Opposed by conservationists because no safe method for disposal of nuclear wastes has been demonstrated. Defeated in Assembly Resources Committee.
9. Vote in Assembly Resources is on a motion to hold in Committee. A yes vote was a vote for nuclear safety.
10. AB 3453 Original Assembly bill dealt with the safety of energy facilities. Opposed by environmentalists in the Senate after an amendment was added exempting Sundesert (as above).
11. AB 3247 (Calvo) Directs the Public Utilities Commission to establish a solar loan program for residences and businesses. Supported by environmentalists. Signed by Governor.

12. SB 1600 (Roberti) Establishes authority for the government to make low interest loans to small businesses to develop or install alternate energy systems. Supported by environmentalists. Died in the final weeks of the session after passing both Houses in slightly different form.
13. SB 1800 (Alquist) would abolish the State Energy Commission and substitute a Department of Energy. Designed to overcome Energy Commission opposition to nuclear power plants and generally weaken California's commitment to safe energy alternatives. Opposed by conservationists. Died in Assembly Resources Committee.
14. SB 1831 (Dunlap) Provides grants for development of small scale energy alternatives. Supported by conservationists. Died in Senate Finance Committee.
15. SB 1566 (Campbell) Abolishes the State Energy Commission and transfers its authority to the State Public Utilities Commission. Opposed by environmentalists because the Energy Commission has a stronger record than the PUC of supporting environmentally sound energy goals. Killed in Senate Finance Committee.
16. AB 3009 Would protect unique hot springs from depletion and encroachment by geothermal development. Supported by conservationists. Killed in Assembly Ways and Means.
17. AB 3748 (Dannemeyer) Would place on the November ballot an exemption for the Sundesert nuclear plant from the state's nuclear safety legislation. Opposed by conservationists. Killed in Assembly Resources Committee.
18. AB 3110 (Bates) Prevents the siting of nuclear facilities of any sort in areas with high earthquake potential. Supported by conservationists for safety reasons. Died on Assembly floor.
19. AB 3220 (Hart) imposes a fee of \$20,000 per day on those spilling oil in coastal or inland water for damage to plants and animals. Killed on Assembly floor.
20. AB3251 (Levine) Taxes industry on their rates of air pollution. These were to be used to provide financial support for local air pollution control districts hurt by Prop 13 funding cutbacks. Supported by conservationists, because the taxes would also provide an incentive to industry to clean up. Died in Senate Government Organization Committee.
21. AB 2854 (Agnos) Would transfer regulatory protection for workers working with pesticides from the Food and Agriculture Department to the Department of Industrial Relations. Supported by environmentalists because the Department of Industrial Relations is generally charged with protecting the health and safety of workers, and the Ag Department has traditionally been responsive to the wishes of pesticide manufacturers and agribusiness. Killed on Assembly floor.
22. SB 1353 (Smith) Would increase oil spill liability to \$6,000 per day for damage to plant and animal life. Supported by conservationists. Killed on Senate Floor.
23. SB 1357 (Behr) Bans the aerial application of herbicides such as 24-5T which contains the highly toxic contaminant dioxin. Supported by conservationists. Killed in Senate Natural Resources.
24. AB 3312 (Levine) Authorizes city and county attorneys to file suit against those damaging or threatening to damage natural resources. Currently only the Attorney General has this power. Supported by conservationists as a means to strengthen the enforcement of California's Environmental Quality Act (CEQA). Died in Senate.
25. SB 1581 (Holmdahl) Limits the number of bobcats that may be killed annually in the state. Supported by conservationists. Killed on Senate floor.
26. AB 3765 (Fazio) Exempts individual farmers from the CEQA requirement that they file an Environmental Impact Report prior to spraying or application of pesticides. Opposed by conservationists in Senate version because it weakened the safeguards against pesticide abuse. Signed by Governor.
